Mission and structure

The ICCA Consortium is an international association dedicated to promoting the appropriate recognition of and support to ICCAs (Indigenous Peoples' and Community Conserved Areas and Territories) in the regional, national and global arena. It is comprised of **Members** (Indigenous People Organisations (IPOs) and Community-based Organisations (CBOs) and civil society organisations working with IPs/LCs) and **Honorary members** (individuals with relevant concerns and expertise relating to ICCAs). As a global institution, the Consortium is collaborating with the CBD Secretariat, GEF SGP, UNEP WCMC, IUCN, research and advocacy organisations, and UN mechanisms promoting human and IP and LC rights.

Brief history

Responding to mounting interest and concerns about ICCAs, several mutually-respected NGOs and organisations representing indigenous and community constituencies (now Consortium Members) established the 'ICCA Consortium' at a gathering during the 4th World Conservation Congress in Barcelona (Spain) in October 2008. These Members agreed on a broad programme of action which provided initial support and stimulus for working towards common ICCA goals. It was during this gathering the ICCA Registry was born: an on-line, internationally recognised ICCA database! Since Barcelona, physical meetings among Consortium Members and Honorary members have taken place during international gatherings and policy events, including meetings of the





Why make a Photo Story?

- To document your ICCA, the issues your community is facing, and the solutions you are trying to find.
- To share your story with others and encourage others to do the same.
- To raise awareness about your efforts.
- To advocate for the respect, recognition and support for ICCAs in general and your ICCA specifically.
- What do you think?

What is a Photo Story?

- A short video (4-5mn) composed of:
- Photos
- Short videos (mini interviews)
- Text (subtitles)
- Recorded voice over
- Background sounds and music
- → a format that can be easily understood (images) and disseminated (e.g. on the Internet).

Who makes it?

- Preferably the whole community: men and women, elders and youth, etc. Preferably all perspectives are reflected.
- Those who are willing (no obligation)
- Delegation to small teams for more 'technical' parts (editing, voice recording, etc.)
- With facilitators (FES, Kalpavriksh, ICCA Consortium)

How to make it?

Step 1: Meeting with DGZ Committee & formation of core team

Step 2: Discussions about DGZ with VC, Women Group, etc. & call for volunteers for scriptwriting & photos taking

Step 3: Collective scriptwriting: the story

How to make it?

Step 4: Photos + sounds/music/voice taken by Ungma & Longsa villagers; previous photos & maps collected from FES, DGZ Committee,...

Step 5: Editing: assembling materials

Step 6: Final meeting: screening, feedback

Step 7: Dissemination

1 – Collecting info



Upstream preparation with FES

- Previous data on the ICCA, analysis of threats and solutions, etc.
- Archive photos/videos
- Maps

2 – First community discussion



Discussion guided by a canvas of questions Possibly separate meetings for men & women

- Describing your
 ICCA
- Identifying threats, constraints, opportunities
- Describing your solutions
- Analysing their results, impact

3 – Collective scriptwriting



Collectively written (sequences) with projector Be careful to keep it simple, as it will determine the material to collect & edit

- Drawing from the discussion outcomes
- How to put information in a story
- 'What do we want to show & say?'

4 – Photos & voice/sounds



1,2 cameras per group => share Voice very important to make story-telling alive

- Short training
- Identification of a team by the community
- Creation of groups, one per topic
- Out in the ICCA to take photos, record sounds and voice

5 - Editing



Identify a small team to whom the community delegates that 'technical' part of the process (with help of facilitators)

- Assembling photos, voices, sounds & music into a video
- Thanks to a software => computer

6 – Second community discussion



Everybody together or men/women separate

- Validation of the Photo Story
- Discussion for its use & future actions
- Feedback onthe process

 (perception,
 lessons learnt)

7 - Dissemination



Final file is a .wmv video of 5 minutes max and about 12 to 25MB size, ideally in local language + in English

 Consortium website
- Community screening evening
- Sending the Photo Story to authorities, press, etc.
- Any other channel or use the community decide to develop
